2010 Census: Redistricting Data

On February 24, 2011 the U.S. Census Bureau delivered to the Governor and the majority and minority leaders of the Utah Legislature the official 2010 Census Redistricting Data Summary File. Under Public Law 94-171, the Census Bureau is required to provide each state small area population counts within one year of census day. The redistricting data can be used to redraw federal, state, and local legislative districts. The 2010 Census redistricting data provide the first look at population counts for small areas and race, Hispanic origin, voting age and housing units.


State of Utah

Utah's April 1, 2010 population reached 2,763,885. This represents a population increase of 530,716 persons, or 23.8% from 2000, ranking Utah third among states in the rate of population growth from 2000 to 2010. Utah grew more than twice as fast as the U.S. (9.7%) during this ten year period. Utah, as well as three of its neighboring states, ranked in the five fastest growing states in the country during the last decade. They include: Nevada (35.1%), Arizona (24.6%), Utah (23.8%), and Idaho (21.1%) with Texas ranking fifth (20.6%).

Utah's Counties

Largest. Salt Lake County continues to be the state's largest county with a population of 1,029,655 in 2010, followed by Utah County (516,564), Davis (306,479), Weber (231,236), Washington (138,115) and Cache (112,656) counties. Daggett County remains the smallest county in the state with a 2010 population of 1,059. With 2,083,934 residents, three out of every four people in the state live in the northern metropolitan area, including Weber, Davis, Salt Lake, and Utah Counties.

Fastest Growing. Wasatch County was the fastest growing county over the decade, increasing 54.7%, from 15,215 in 2000 to 23,530 in 2010. Washington was the second fastest growing county in the state during the 2000s, with a 52.9% increase over the decade, more than two times the state rate. Many of the fastest growing counties are in close proximity to Salt Lake County. These counties include



Wasatch (54.7%); Tooele (42.9%); Utah (40.2%); Morgan (32.8%); and Davis (28.2%). The other fastest growing counties in the state

are Utah (40%); Daggett (34%); and Cache (30%). Millard County, with a growth rate of just 0.8% over the decade, was the slowest growing county in the state.

Utah's Cities

Largest. Salt Lake City is once again the largest city in the state with a 2010 population of 186,440, followed by West Valley City (129,480); Provo (112,488); West Jordan (103,712); Orem (88,328); Sandy (87,461); Ogden (82,825); St. George (72,897); Layton (67,311); and Taylorsville (58,652).

Fastest Growing. Of the top ten fastest growing cities, nine more than doubled their population. Saratoga Springs was the fastest growing city in the state from 2000, growing an astounding 1672.8%, from 1,003 in 2000 to 17,781 in 2010. Following closely behind, Herriman grew from 1,523 to 21,785 or 1330.4%. The remaining fastest growing cities are Eagle Mountain (892.8%), Cedar Hills (216.6%), Nibley (165.9%), Syracuse (158.9%), West Haven (158.4%), Lehi (149.1%), Washington (129.2%), and Farr West (91.6%).

Utah's Hispanic Population

The Hispanic population in Utah increased from 201,559 in 2000 to 358,340 in 2010, a 77.8% increase. Hispanics make up 13.0% of

Utah's population, an increase from 2000 when 9.0% of Utah's population was Hispanic. Counties in Utah with the highest percent of Hispanics compared to their total population include: Salt Lake (17.1%); Weber (16.7%); Wasatch (13.5%); Millard (12.8%), and Carbon (12.4%). Cities with the highest percentage of Hispanics include: Hideout (77.0%); Wendover (68.3%); West Valley (33.1%); Ogden (30.1%); and South Salt Lake (29.1%).

Utah's Population by Race

The majority of Utahns (97.3%) selected only one race in 2010. Among those that selected a single race, the majority were White (86.1%), followed by Asian (2.0%), American Indian and Alaska Native (1.2%), Black or African American (1.1%), Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander (0.9%) and Some Other Race (6.0%). Also among those selecting a single race, 80.4% identified as White Non-Hispanic. Only 2.7% of Utahns selected more than one race on the 2010.



2010 Census: Mean Center of Population

After each decennial census, the U.S. Census Bureau calculates the center of population in the United States. The point is the place where an imaginary, flat, weightless and rigid map of the U.S. would balance perfectly if all residents counted in the 2010 Census were of identical weight. The center of population in the United States is now located 2.7 miles from Plato, Missouri, a rural area in central Missouri. This is the fourth time the mean center has been in Missouri starting with the 1980 Census.

The original center of population in the United States in 1790 was near Chestertown, Maryland. Since then, the center of population in the has consistently moved south and west over time, crossing the states of Virginia, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois.

The national shift of the population center reveals trends in American population growth and movement. Increasingly, the largest population growth has occurred in the southern and western portions of the nation. The sources of increased population growth in these areas are from both natural increase and net in-migration; however migration is increasingly becoming the primary source of population growth in the South and West. As population growth continues, the center of population in America is expected to continue its shift to the southwest. ■



Affiliates Corner: Uintah Basin Association of Governments



ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS

This is Home: The Uintah Basin Association of Governments serves the industrious and resilient residents of Daggett, Duchesne, and Uintah Counties. This isolated wilderness oasis spans approxi-

mately 8,478 square miles in northeastern Utah. The tri-county area is home to over 50,000 residents, a very proud contingency of the Ute Tribal Nation, and numerous species of wildlife. In addition to being a scenic recreation and vacation destination, the Uintah Basin is the center for energy development and extraction in Utah. This unique balance of work and fun is what inspires the dedicated employees of the Uintah Basin Association of Governments to increase their efforts as they attempt to satisfy the unmet needs of our friends and neighbors.

Accepting the Challenge: Organized in 1970 by Governor Calvin L. Rampton, the Uintah Basin Association of Governments shares the same mandate charged to each of the seven AOGs chartered throughout Utah. Each has been challenged to improve local government coordination and facilitate the planning, development, and sustainability of each of the communities located in our respective geographical areas. Empowered by a governing board of locally elected officials, our executive director has laid out the course for how we can best manage and disperse the federal, state, and privately granted funds available to our organization and the residents of the Basin.

Meeting the Need: Through generous and inspired grant programs, the AOG is able to assist many members of its communities in meeting their needs when personal efforts are inadequate or insufficient. Low-income households and members of the elderly community that qualify for assistance have often found that helping hand within our organization to lift them over to better financial times. The HEAT program has distributed over \$2.5 million during the past five years to approximately 5,430 households to assist with utility costs during the harsh winters experienced in the Uintah Basin. The Aging program provides invaluable assistance to the elderly with countless meals, senior center activities, education, transportation, and social and community involvement that brings purpose and peace of mind to many lives and communities. The Food Pantries, funded through the federal Community Services Block Grant program and countless volunteer hours, delivered over 6,500 food boxes (a three day supply for a family of four) to nearly 5,000 households during this past fiscal year. The Weatherization program utilizes its generous resources to improve the standard of living for hundreds of qualified residents of the Basin. Our specialists are able to install or replace windows, doors, insulation, furnaces, or water heaters to ensure that low-income families are able to efficiently heat their homes and reduce energy waste. A federal mandate stipulates that only high efficiency equipment/material be utilized during improvement efforts to allow for energy cost savings to repay the total investment costs within seven years of the date of installation. These are all beloved programs and our offices are visited daily with notes of thank you and appreciation for the blessings of hope and peace that are shared throughout our communities.

Building Community: Self reliance is the greatest gift that you can give to anyone. The Uintah Basin Association of Governments has



taken an active role in assisting qualifying applicants to provide for their families and improve their standard of living. The Self-Help program has recently completed its 100th home. This program allows qualifying families to work together to build each other's home.

No one is given a certificate of occupancy until each family is ready to move in. Participants must have outside employment and spend a minimum of 30 hours a week on the project. They are able to use their personal labor on the homes as equity toward their federal mortgage loans. Since 2008, the Self-Help program has spent nearly \$2.9 million, saved approximately 140 jobs, and touched countless lives. The funding was spent locally; injecting much needed cash into a struggling economy. Utilizing the Single Family Rehabilitation and Replacement Program, the AOG has partnered with the Uintah Basin Applied Technology College and the Duchesne County Sheriff's Office to provide vocational training to inmates while improving the standard of living for several families each year. Inmates are able to build replacement homes in segments, within a secure environment, which are then assembled in the community to replace homes whose value has diminished below 50% of what it would cost to repair the property. This rehabilitative relationship improves the lives of the inmates, the participants, and the communities involved.

Envisioning the Future: The Uintah Basin Association of Governments most recent partnership endeavor involves federal, state, local, tribal, and private entities putting aside political issues and striving to fund an unmet need within the Basin. The recent creation of the Basin Transit Association (BTA) will provide a simple, but needed, form of public transit to the residents and visitors of the Uintah Basin. The BTA will start small with commuter services along U.S. Highway 40 between Duchesne and Vernal, and localized services in Roosevelt and Vernal. Para-transit services will be provided along all fixed routes to meet the challenges of those who may be limited in their access to transit services. Services are scheduled to begin in April 2011. Public transit is having tremendous impact throughout rural Utah. The Uintah Basin Association of Governments is hoping to have similar success as we strive to meet the needs of our communities. Community is about people helping people. The AOG exists to manage programs, cultivate cooperation, facilitate planning, distribute funding and foster an environment where this can occur. We are as vital and integral a part of the Uintah Basin as Flaming Gorge, the Ashley National Forest, and Kings Peak. ■
