U.S. Census Bureau 2012 County Population Estimates

The U.S. Census Bureau recently released July 1, 2012 county population. Of the top-ten fastest-growing counties with a population greater than 10,000, six were located in the south, three in the mid-west, and one were in the west. Chattahoochee County, Georgia was the fastest growing county at 10.1% followed by Williams County, North Dakota (9.3%); Geary County, Kansas (7.4%); Richland County, Montana (6.6%); Stark County, North Dakota (6.5%); Fredericksburg, Virginia (5.6%); Long County, Georgia (5.6%); St. Bernard Parish, Louisiana (5.3%); Russell County, Alabama (5.1%); and Midland County, Texas (4.7%).

Utah had three counties rank in the top 100 fastest growing counties with a population over 10,000 in the nation from July 1, 2011 to July 1, 2012 which include Uintah (14th at 4.1%), Wasatch (15th at 3.8%), and Washington (79th at 2.3%).

Harris County, Texas had the largest numerical increase from July 1, 2011 to July 1, 2012 with 80,005 new residents. It was followed by Los Angeles County, California (73,764); Maricopa County, Arizona (73,644); Dallas County, Texas (45,827); and San Diego County, California (38,880). Only two counties in Utah were ranked in the top 100 counties in the nation. Salt Lake County had a numerical population increase from 2011 to 2012 of 16,096 people ranking 31st and Utah County ranked had an increase of 10,400 and ranked 52nd in the U.S.

The largest county in the nation was once again Los Angeles County, California with 9.96 million residents, followed by Cook County, Illinois (5.23 million); Harris County, Texas (4.25 million); Maricopa County, Arizona (3.94 million); and San Diego County, California (3.18 million). Salt Lake County was the only county in Utah to



make the top 100 list, ranking 39th in the nation with a population of 1,063,842. According to the Census Bureau estimates, Salt Lake County continues to be Utah's most populous county, followed by Utah (540,504), Davis (315,809), Weber (236,640), and Washington

County-to-County Migration Flows

The Census Bureau recently released migration tables which show county-to-county moves across the United States. The tables were created using data collected by the American Community Survey between 2006 and 2010. People in households were asked where they lived a year ago and the responses were combined into a weighted average for the period. In the U.S., 47.3 million people lived in a different house a year earlier and 17.3 million of them lived in a different county. The data shows about 130,000 people in the U.S. moved each day. In Utah, 472,247 people lived a different house a year earlier, which shows about 1,293 people in Utah moved each day.

In Utah, it was most common for people to move to a different house within the same county with 59.7% of the movers. Salt Lake County had the highest percentage of movers staying within the county with 66.9%, followed by Rich (64.4%), Washington (61.4%), Weber (61.3%), and Utah (60.0%). Wayne County had the lowest percentage of movers staying in the county with 18.7%. When looking at the movers from different counties within the state, Morgan County had the highest percentage at 52.1%, followed by Sanpete (48.7%), Beaver (46.4%), Daggett (40.3%), and Millard (40.3%). The percent of people moving to a different county for the State of Utah was 17.4%.

People who moved to Utah from a different state comprised 18.7% of the total movers in the state. Kane County had the highest percentage of out-of-state movers with 39.2%, followed by Piute (37.7%), Summit (36.7%), Emery (36.7%), and Emery (31.4%). Juab County had the smallest percentage of out-of-state movers with 5.6%. People who moved to Utah from abroad accounted for only 4.1% of all movers. Wayne County had the largest percentage of movers from abroad with 36.5%, which is the largest percentage of any category of movers within the county.

Migration into and out of Utah were from counties across all of the United States. The most diverse list of counties was the migration to Salt Lake County. The largest in-migration to Salt Lake County was from Los Angeles County with a net-gain of 1,821. Within the state, the largest in-migration was from Utah County with 966. The top 10 largest in-migration to Salt Lake County were from counties out-of-state, with the only exception being to Utah County. The counties which had the most out-migration from Salt Lake County were Davis (1,797), Weber (1,030), Cache (880), Uintah (648), and Tooele (646). The Census Bureau has developed a mapping tool called Census Flows Mapper <http://flowsmapper.geo.census.gov/flowsmapper/map.html> which allows the user to choose any county in the nation and see the migration into and out of that county. ■
