2005 Subcounty Population Estimates

The U.S. Census Bureau released July 1, 2005 subcounty population estimates on June 21, 2006. The report includes estimates for all 19,471 incorporated places in the nation, 237 in Utah, as well as the unincorporated balance of counties.

Nation

According to U.S. Census Bureau population estimates for July 1, 2005, seven of the nation's top 10 fastest growing large cities (population of 100,000 or more) are in the western states of Arizona, California, and Nevada, with the remaining three cities in Florida.

Elk Grove, CA had the nation's fastest growth rate (11.6%) among large cities between July 1, 2004 and July 1, 2005. It was followed by North Las Vegas, NV (11.4%), Port St. Lucie, FL (11.0), Gilbert, AZ (11.0%), and Cape Coral, FL (9.2%). Rounding out the top ten fastest growing large cities in the U.S. are: Moreno Valley, CA; Rancho Cucamonga, CA; Miramar, FL; Chandler, AZ; and Irvine, CA.

Phoenix, AZ, once again had the largest numerical population increase between 2004 and 2005, adding 44,456 people. It was followed by San Antonio, TX (21,420), Fort Worth, TX (21,000), North Las Vegas, NV (18,095), and Gilbert, AZ (17,173).

New York City continued to be the nation's most populous city, with 8.1 million residents. This is more than twice the population of Los Angeles, which ranked second at 3.8 million. It was followed by Chicago (2.8 million), Houston (2.0 million) and Philadelphia (1.5 million).

Utah

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Herriman town had the highest growth rate between July 1, 2004 and July 1, 2005. It grew at a rate of 32.9% and was followed by Washington (18.1%), Eagle Mountain (18.1%), Cedar Hills (16.9%), and Lehi (14.8%).

St. George saw the most growth with an increase of 4,124 persons. It was followed by Lehi (4,097), South Jordan (3,418), Herriman (2,776), and West Jordan (2,489).

Salt Lake City continued to be Utah's most populous city with a population of 178,097, followed by Provo (113,459), West Valley City (113,300), West Jordan (91,444), and Orem (89,713).

With the release of the 2005 estimates, six of Utah's incorporated places changed the class of city in which they are grouped. Lehi (31,730) moved from a fourth class city to a third class city. Herriman (11,226), Hurricane (10,989), North Salt Lake (10,538), and Eagle Mountain (10,343) all moved from a fifth class city to a fourth class city. Finally, Spring City (1,003) moved from a town classification to that of a fifth class city.

House Prices Continue to Increase

The Office of Federal Housing Enterprise Oversight (OFHEO) recently released house price data for the first quarter of 2006. The OFHEO House Price Index shows that in the first quarter of 2006, U.S. home prices were 12.5% higher than they were one year earlier, and prices in Utah were 14.7% higher.

The growth in house prices grew at a faster rate than the prices of non-housing goods and services. According to the Consumer Price Index, non-housing goods and services rose 4.2%, while house prices increased 12.5%. Despite this increase, appreciation from the fourth quarter of 2005 was 2.0%, the lowest rate since the first quarter of 2001. This may indicate that price growth is moderating in some parts of the country, especially in those areas that have previously experienced the fastest rise in prices.

National Data

Arizona experienced the greatest appreciation rate in the first quarter of 2006, registering a year over growth rate of 32.8%. It was followed by Florida (26.6%), Hawaii (25.0%), Oregon (21.0%), and the District of Columbia (20.8%). Of the 19 states that ranked above the national average, 12 were located in the western United States.

Michigan experienced the lowest appreciation rate in the first quarter of 2006, with a year over growth rate of 2.9%. It was followed by Ohio (3.3%), Indiana (4.2%), Nebraska (4.5%) and Kansas (4.8%). No state experienced negative growth from the previous year or the previous quarter.

The Pacific region experienced an appreciation rate of 18.0% in the first quarter of 2006, it was followed by Mountain (17.8%), South Atlantic (17.2%), Middle Atlantic (13.3%) and New England (8.7%) regions. The Central regions experienced the lowest appreciation rates; East and West South Central both experienced 7.7% apprecia-

tion, followed by West North Central (6.2%), and East North Central (5.6%).

The St. George, UT Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) experienced 38.4% appreciation in the first quarter of 2006, the highest rate in the nation. It was followed by Naples-Marco Island, FL MSA (37.7%), Cape Coral-Fort Myers, FL MSA (36.9%), Phoenix-Mesa-Scottsdale, AZ (36.5%) and Lakeland, FL MSA (35.6%). Other Utah MSAs ranked as follows: Flagstaff, AZ-UT MSA (9th, 30.5%), Salt Lake City, UT MSA (76th, 16.3%), Provo-Orem, UT MSA (113th, 10.9%), Ogden-Clearfield, UT MSA (130th, 9.2%), and the Logan, UT-ID MSA (199th, 5.4%).



Utah Data

Utah house prices were 14.7% higher in the first quarter of 2006 than in the previous year. This was above the national average of 12.5%, and ranked Utah 15th among the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

The rate of 14.7% was the fastest appreciation Utah has experienced in over a decade. House price appreciation peaked at 18.2% in the second quarter of 1994. Appreciation rates stayed strong through the third (17.6%) and fourth (15.5%) quarters of that year, but continued to decline throughout the rest of the 1990s. Appreciation rates bottomed out in the fourth quarter of 1999 (-0.9%), but have remained positive since 2000.

Historical Educational Attainment

According to historical statistics recently released by the Census Bureau, Utah's educational attainment consistently exceeded that of the United States throughout the last century. This release chronicled educational attainment on both the national and state level from 1940 to 2000. The data also included educational attainment by sex and race.

National Data

The educational attainment of the nation's population has increased dramatically over the latter part of the 20th century. This increase in educational attainment coincides with many other data to show how the nation's economy and demographic landscape changed from 1940 to 2000.

In 1940, America was in the depths of the depression, on the cusp of World War II, and Franklin Delano Roosevelt shattered the two-term tradition and defeated Wendell Wilkie. The population of the nation was 131.7 million, 43.5% of which was rural, and 56.5% urban. The unemployment rate for the nation was 14.6%, the gross domestic product was \$1.0 trillion (chained 2000 dollars), and per capita income was \$7,319 (2000 dollars).

In 1940, 24.5% of the adult population (ages 25 and older) had a high school diploma (or higher), and only 4.6% had a bachelor's degree (or higher).

In 2000, instead of one-quarter of the nation's adult population having a high school diploma, one-quarter had at least a bachelor's degree and over 80% had completed high school. The population of the United States in 2000 was 281.4 million, 21.0% of which was rural, and 79.0% urban. The unemployment rate for the nation was 4.0%, the gross domestic product was \$9.8 trillion, and per capita income was \$29,469.



In 2000, 80.4% of the adult population had a high school diploma, and 24.4% had a bachelor's degree.

Regional Data

From 1940 to 1980, the West was the most highly educated region in the country, however, this changed in the last decade of the 20th century.

In 1940, 34.8% of the adult population in the West had a high school degree, followed by the Midwest (25.0%), the Northeast (24.0%) and the South (20.3%). These rankings remained mostly unchanged until 1990 when 77.1% of the adult population in the Midwest had a high school degree, followed by the Northeast (76.2%), the West (73.7%), and the South (71.3%). In 2000, these rankings remained unchanged, with Midwest (83.5%) ranking first, followed by the Northeast (81.6%), the West (79.9%), and the South (77.7%).

This same trend also applied to college graduates. In 1940, 6.2% of the adult population in the West had a college degree, followed by the Northeast (5.0%), the Midwest (4.2%) and the South (4.0%). These rankings also held relatively steady until 1990 when 22.8% of the adult population in the Northeast had a college degree, followed by the West (22.7%), the South (18.7%), and the Midwest (18.4%). In 2000, the Northeast (27.5%) again ranked first, followed by the West (26.2%), the Midwest (22.9%), and the South (22.5%).



State Data

The educational attainment of Utah's population has historically outpaced that of the nation, also showing the changing nature of Utah's economy and residents.

Historical Educational Attainment

In 1940, the Great Depression had hit Utah especially hard. Between 1932 and 1940 the average unemployment in Utah was 25.0%, and the average per capita income was \$5,904 (2000 dollars). The population of Utah was 550,310, 55.5% of which was urban, and 44.5% rural. In 1940, 37.0% of Utah's adult population had a high school degree, and 6.2% had a bachelor's degree.

In 2000, Utah's unemployment rate was 3.4%, and the average per capita income was \$23,476. Utah's population was 2.2 million, 88.2% of which was urban, and 11.8% rural. In 2000, 87.7% had a high school degree and 26.1% had a bachelor's degree.

In 1940, Utah had the third highest educational attainment for high school degrees in the nation, and ranked first in the nation in 1960 and 1970. They remained in the top five until the end of the century, and in 2000 ranked fourth highest in the nation. Utah had the fifth highest educational attainment for bachelor's degree in the nation in 1940, by the year 2000 it had dropped to 15th.

Sex & Race Data



Throughout the 20th century, men were more likely to have a bachelor's degree than women, but less likely to have a high school degree. The educational attainment gap between Whites, Hispanics and Blacks continued to increase in nearly all areas at the end of the 20th century.

In 1940, 22.7% of adult men and 26.3% of adult women had a high school diploma. Women ranked above men each decade until 1980 when 65.8% of adult women and 67.3% of adult men had a high school diploma. Men again outranked women in 1990. However, in 2000, 80.7% of women and 80.1% of men had high school degrees. Utah followed this same trend, and in 2000, 88.1% of adult women and 87.3% of adult men had a high school degree.

In 1940, 5.5% of adult men and 3.8% of adult women had a bachelor's degree. In 2000, 26.1% of men and 22.9% of women had a bachelor's degree. In 1940, 7.5% of adult men in Utah and 4.7% of adult women had a bachelor's degree. In 2000, 30.0% of men and 22.3% of women had a bachelor's degree.

Race data were only available for two races (White and Black) and Hispanic origin from 1980 to 2000. In 1980, 69.6% of adult Whites had a high school degree, followed by 51.2% of Blacks and 44.0% of Hispanics.

In 2000, it was 85.5% for Whites, 72.3% for Blacks and 52.4% for Hispanics. Whereas the gap between Whites and Blacks with high school degrees decreased, the gap between Whites and Hispanics continued to widen. In 1980, 17.4% of adult Whites had a bachelor's degree, followed by 8.4% of Blacks and 7.6% of Hispanics. In 2000, it was 27.0% of Whites, 14.3% of Blacks and 10.4% of Hispanics. In this case, the difference between Whites and both Blacks and Hispanics increased.



Utah followed this same trend. In 1980, 81.4% of adult Whites in Utah had a high school degree, followed by 69.7% of Blacks and 52.1% of Hispanics. In 2000, it was 91.0% of Whites, 83.2% of Blacks, and 56.5% of Hispanics. In 1980, 20.4% of Whites had a bachelor's degree, followed by 13.9% of Blacks and 7.9% of Hispanics. In 2000, it was 27.7% of Whites, 19.8% of Blacks and 9.8% of Hispanics.



Affiliates Corner: Bear River Association of Governments

The Bear River Association of Governments (BRAG) is a voluntary association of local governments from Box Elder, Cache and Rich counties. It was created to facilitate intergovernmental cooperation and to insure effective and efficient management of federal, state, and local programs for the solution of mutual problems in the region.

Mission

The overall goal of BRAG is to serve as a multi-purpose organization, utilizing its combined total resources and shared staff to provide a more effective means for planning and development of the physical, economic, and human resources of the region.

Background

Much of the impetus for regional cooperation among local governments began in the 1960s. During this time local governments throughout the country began experiencing new challenges due to environmental and social issues. Increasing urbanization and rapid growth in many cities and metropolitan areas, led to an improved transportation system, making community boundaries less important. These factors helped contribute to the realization that many problems faced by a community extended beyond traditional boundaries.

In an effort to meet the demand for services and yet restrict the growth of more government agencies, the federal government initiated efforts to develop coordinated and cooperative planning. In 1966, Governor Calvin Rampton began meeting with local officials to discuss establishing multi-county planning districts. During that same year the Utah State Legislature passed the Interlocal Cooperation Act allowing local governments to work together to administer programs of mutual benefit to all of them. In 1970, Governor Rampton issued an executive order establishing eight multi-county districts in the state. In 1973 the number was reduced to the seven that currently exist.

Services

The BRAG organization not only provides a wide range of publicly funded services for the three most northern counties of Utah, it also has been recognized over the years with many different titles. Some of the currently held titles include: economic development district, regional planning agency, regional development organization, regional housing authority, community action agency, area agency on aging, and heritage area.

The Utah State Data Center Program

In 1982 the State of Utah entered into a voluntary agreement with the U.S. Census Bureau to establish the Utah State Data Center (SDC) program. The SDC program provides training and technical assistance in accessing and using census data for research, administration, planning, and decision-making by the government, the business community, university researchers, and other interested data users.

The Governor's Office of Planning and Budget serves as the lead coordinating agency for 34 organizations in Utah that make up the Utah State, Business, and Industry Data Center (SDC/BIDC) information network. This extensive network of SDC affiliates consists of major universities, libraries, regional and local organizations, as well as government agencies that produce primary data on the Utah economy. Each of these affiliates use, and provide the public with economic, demographic, or fiscal data on Utah.
